Investment Objective

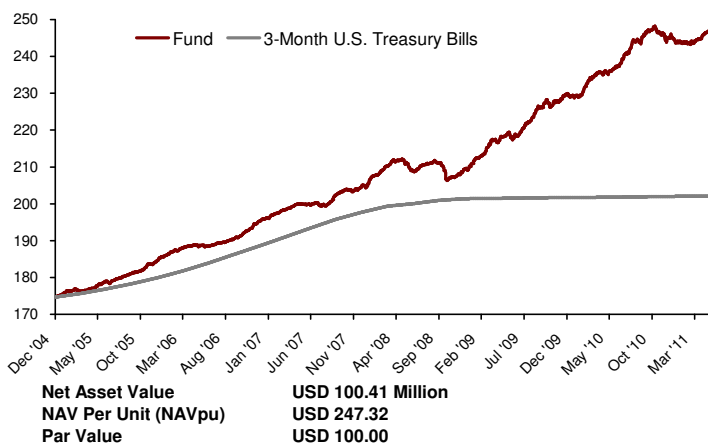

Fund Manager's Report

Monthly Commentary

Philippine dollar-denominated bond prices were markedly higher, increasing by 0.87% on the average, with most of the gains coming in the 10-year and longer tenors, causing yields to decline by 16 basis points. Positive reports from the government gave fundamental support to ROPs. The government reported a PHP26.3Bn budget surplus for the month of April. Although this was widely expected as April is tax month, the administration's fiscal stance now stands balanced for the first 4 months of the year. The government likewise reported a USD1.08Bn surplus in its balance of payments in April, bringing the 4-month surplus to USD4.6Bn. This reflects the continued strength of OFW dollar remittances from abroad, even as the MENA crisis remains unresolved and the impact of the Japanese quake proves to be larger than initially expected. However, Philippine GDP slowed down for the first quarter, expanding 4.9% year-on-year, a more measured pace compared to the previous quarter's. The 5-year Philippine credit default swap spreads widened slightly, by 3 points from 130 to the 133 level.

In the US, weak economic data and renewed fiscal concerns continued to weigh down on risk-taking. Concerns over Eurozone sovereign debt likewise remains high, as manifested by recent downgrades on sovereigns from the major rating agencies. These concerns caused equity markets both in the US and Europe to fall by 1.88% and 4.15%, respectively, in May, pushing investors to seek the relative safety of US Treasuries. US Treasury yields slid by 20 basis points on average, while the benchmark European yield curve also shed 22 basis points. ROP prices remained firm with some gains amid the sustained inflow to emerging market debt.

Strategy

The Fund lengthened its duration from the previous 3.19 to 3.29 in the month of May. This enabled the Fund to outperform its benchmark, the 91-day US Treasury Bill. Moving forward, we will maintain the Fund's overweight duration and further diversify its portfolio to Philippine corporate bonds so as to benefit from the yield pickup these bonds have to offer.

Risk Disclosure

The Fund is suitable for investors who take medium to long-term views. As a marked-to-market UITF, the Fund's yield, net asset value, and total return may fall as well as rise as a result of interest rate movements and the changes in credit quality of the investments. Risk Management

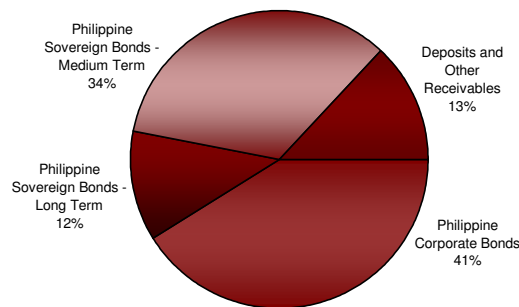
In accordance with the provisions in the Declaration of Trust, the Fund implements a risk management policy that applies the principles of Value-at-Risk (VAR). VAR is a measure of the portfolio's maximum potential loss and is computed based on price volatility and market value of the investment portfolio. The Fund's risk management policy prescribes a dynamic volatility band, such that if the volatility of the Fund's investments as reflected in the NAVpu exceeds the volatility band, adjustments are made for the collective interest of the participants. The Fund may also use financial derivatives to hedge the portfolio against market and credit risks.

The higher the number, the higher the potential gain or loss. Sharpe ratio evaluates reward-to-risk efficiency. The higher the number, the higher the reward per unit of risk.
